

BOARD CHAIR REPORT

It has been a good year for Beyond Words. Our success and development this year are evident in our growing community of volunteers, our stronger finances, our improved organisation and the gradual increase in the number of biographies as the aged care sector recovers from COVID-19. The details are in the reports on our program, financial situation, fundraising and the other reports that follow.

This success has enabled the board to take a major step forward in building a sustainable organisation. We have employed an outstanding information officer and are now able to employ a part time coordinator. These two roles will ensure that our systems and organisation are well-managed to support our growing community of biographers and operational volunteers.

A general meeting on Monday 7th August agreed new rules for the board that limit the number of board members to seven elected and two co-opted members. Elected directors can serve two-year terms renewable for up to eight years.

This year Austin Paterson, Nigel McQuitty and I will be standing for re-election. Toby Hayes will take a well-earned break. I have appreciated Toby's active and intelligent participation in board meetings through the challenging last three years. He led the early development of the fundraising committee that included producing a fine prospectus. He will continue as a biographer and be available to help the board when his legal expertise is required.

I applaud the commitment of all our board members who in addition to our monthly board meeting have met many times to pursue a range of issues. We are all members of our fundraising committee and volunteer time and talent in innumerable other ways.

A message from Vera Considine our Finance Officer:

Richard Hill with his leadership style of tireless attention to detail, infectious enthusiasm, and encouragement to support a growing team of volunteers has presided over a remarkable rebuilding of the organisation. As a result, the financial position has improved remarkably through sponsorship, grants and generous donations to reach a very stable bank balance of \$34,860.53 as of 30th June 2023, enabling the organisation to plan the employment of support staff as the next step in development.

Whatever the reason, the improvement in our financial position is evident in the attached financial statements. The fundraising committee have produced outstanding and successful applications.

Our income has expanded particularly thanks to the grant generously provided by the Jack Brockhoff Foundation. There are several grant and sponsorship prospects giving us reasonable confidence that we can sustain our income and meet the employment costs, which are now our major expense.

Thanks go to the fundraising committee for this success, and to Vera for meticulously maintaining and reporting finances through the year.

Our growing finances mean the need for more scrutiny. We are currently seeking a probono auditor for our financial systems and accounts.

FUNDRAISING SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT

Several months on, the fundraising subcommittee is still celebrating our success in securing funds to support some paid administrative support for Beyond Words.

We hope to look back upon the \$32,450 grant awarded from the Jack Brockhoff Foundation in 2022 as a major turning point in the organisation's renewal period. The impact of this generous gift will be realised through the greater number of biographies enabled by better systems and processes and reducing the load for our dedicated volunteers. Many individuals and families will benefit, and we extend our deep gratitude to the Jack Brockhoff Foundation leadership and trustees for investing in our work.

Two other grants we submitted this year were unsuccessful. After putting so much work into the applications, this may seem disappointing. But each one helps us hone our grant-writing skills and clarify our funding needs, so it's all part of the pathway to success.

Fundraising is as much about networking and relationships as it is about money, so we are fortunate to have the inimitable Austin Paterson on our board and fundraising subcommittee. It seems there are not many people in Victoria's grant-making and aged-care sectors who aren't connected with Austin in some way. With concerted and collaborative support from the management group and subcommittee, Austin has helped us connect with and explore many sponsorship and grant opportunities.

Through a combination of meetings, proposals and our wonderful new social media presence, we will continue to build awareness among funders of Beyond Words' impact on our community. Not all opportunities will come to fruition and some may take a while to bear fruit, but we are definitely making progress. We feel sure there are other people in our extended network who might wish to make a meaningful contribution to our community, and we are here to help facilitate the joy of giving. Anyone wanting to share in this rewarding work would be a welcome addition to the fundraising subcommittee!

Encouraging our supporters to consider leaving a Gift in their Will to Beyond Words is also part of our fundraising strategy. We can certainly demonstrate that even a small gift can leave a huge legacy for our clients and their families. 

PROGRAM COORDINATOR REPORT

Despite aged care residences (ACRs) continuing to be affected by partial and complete COVID-19 lock-downs we managed to navigate our way through the interruptions to visits and achieved good results in service delivery and training.

We had a productive day in late 2022 when we prepared a group of biographers to assist in liaising with ACRs in their own areas and conduct the resulting assessments. However, this development has been slow to progress as the group of biographers encountered personal situations that impeded their capacity to commence. We are now trialing another approach to spread the workload of this activity on which Beyond Words critically depends.

Our reach during the year extended to Geelong, Trentham and Kilmore. There is keen interest from Regional Victoria that we need to address as we strengthen our resources and capacity.

It's concerning that we are unable to respond to the many approaches we receive to assist those in home and palliative care. Again, in time, we can maybe explore partnerships with other bodies to enable them to work in these deserving areas.

My sincere thanks go to the people from Beyond Words, our partners in the aged care sector, and the many wonderful residents who have entrusted us to preserve their remarkable stories.

EDITORIAL TEAM REPORT

The flow of biographies has been smoother this year as we move beyond the issues brought by the disruption of the COVID-19 years. This 2022-2023 financial year we edited, formatted and printed twenty-six biographies and as the organisation continues to train biographers and assign them to clients, we are certain we will reach our goal of seventy-five to a hundred biographies per year.

During the editing process, we continue to ensure we preserve the client's voice but also present the life story to the reader as clearly as possible. This can be a fine balancing act, but we respect the integrity of the client's voice and the work of our biographers to create lasting legacy documents. In addition, this year our copy editors and proof-readers have enhanced our process by providing biographers with a short paragraph of feedback to help them improve future biographies.

In addition to editing, the team continue to contribute to the monthly forum, have a column called; From the Editor's Desk, in the monthly newsletter, and assist with many other aspects of Beyond Words such as the training program and fundraising.

I would like to thank the small team of eagle-eyed editors; Andrew, Val, Brigid and Hannah who are always willing, sometimes at short notice, to edit the precious life stories that we are entrusted. Of course, our biographies would not look professional without our fantastic formatter, Dianne, who ensures the layout is clear, photographs and other contents are captioned, and all these contribute to an engaging story.

I.T. REPORT

We have taken major steps this year to improve the management and sharing of our information, which will help us to streamline our operations and ensure information is up to date.

Key to this has been the implementation of a new web-based system to track our volunteers, biographies, and the details of the aged care residences we work with. Training of key volunteers in the use of this system and automation of some processes will be the next step of this implementation.

Communication with our volunteers has been improved through the creation of centralised email distribution lists.

The information available on the website continues to be improved and a blog has been created to allow more in-depth articles to be produced and easily shared on social media.

TRAINING TEAM REPORT

Eighteen people have been trained in the last year to help our Beyond Words clients capture their stories.

We now offer a three-day course spread over seven to ten days, which gives trainees more time to preview our website's resources page and to absorb more of the material presented and discussed. We believe this enables trainees to engage more actively with trainers and colleagues, and to complete the homework exercises more confidently.

We have tried to remove some of the stress associated with using Beyond Words templates and styles. This is because we want the initial training to be more attuned to the essence of - and writing - the story.

The first biography is now considered to be part of the initial training. A new biographer needs to discuss their experience, the process, the story with their area coordinator and or an experienced "biography buddy" to complete their learning.

The training course in Geelong revealed the advantage of a geographical connection. Trainees were linked by virtue of their region and seemed more likely to bond.

I am still in contact with members of my training cohort. We helped each other enormously in our early days with Beyond Words and still it is wonderful to have this link for both biography and friendship.
